A Note from the Director

School has started and the fall season has begun! This is, happily, always a busy season for the Library. I would like to take this opportunity to point out some "don't miss" sections of this newsletter for your information.

Programming News – Don't miss all of our children's, young adult, adult, family, and special programming/exhibits listed in this newsletter for the fall season! Also, in respect to programming news, I would like to let you know about the following:

Summer Reading Program – The 2011 Summer Reading Program was one of the most well-attended Summer Reading Programs we have ever had! We had a registration of 278 children, tweens, and teens. A total of 2,416 books were read! Three big prizes were given to the three top readers at the end of the program. We had a total of twelve weekly prize winners (three per week) and over forty honorable mention prize winners. The Library presented two staff-led crafts, taught the children a different international board game each week, and presented a children's movie at each of our over 20 reporting sessions. Besides our reporting days' crafts, games & movies, two staff-led programs, ten performance programs (hired performers), and twelve staff-led computer programs were offered.

The Summer Reading Program ended with a celebratory Carnival and Ice Cream Party for the younger children and a bus trip to the Ulster County Fair for the tweens and teens. We congratulate the children and tweens and teens who participated, the parents and caregivers who encouraged them, and especially our young adult volunteers, who contributed mightily to the program's success.

Most importantly, special congratulations, thanks, and recognition must be given to staff member, Jill Cronin, our Youth Services' Supervisor, who developed, promoted, recruited volunteers, and implemented the Summer Reading Program as well as, for the second year in a row, secured grant funds to support the Summer Reading performance programs.

Reference Resources – This section highlights resources which are helpful to students and life-long learners in their quest for knowledge.

Downloadable Free Books on One Click Audio – The Library has two different sites (**One Click** and **Overdrive**) from which you can download e-Content (e-Audiobooks and e-Books) to your home computer 24/7 and then transfer it to your preferred device. Due to a revamp of One Click's computer platform, One Click is currently not available, but should be working shortly. Both can be accessed from the Library's web site at www.gwllibrary.org. At our web site, click on the Downloadable Books button on the left of our home page and

click One Click or Overdrive; click Log in and follow the instructions. You can register at home by using your Greenwood Lake Public Library card's barcode, which is on the back of your card.

Museum Passes – Museum passes are available for check out by adults and families. Unfortunately, our most popular pass to the Museum of Natural History in New York has raised their price and limited the number of tickets. **Please note: all passes can only be lent to residents of the Greenwood Lake Union Free School District with a valid Library card.** For questions on museum pass policies, call Jill Cronin (Ext. 109 or 110).

RCLS New Computer System – RCLS (Ramapo Catskill Library System), of which our Library is a member, will be updating their computers to a new system on December 8th, 2011. As with all changeovers, there may be some down time and glitches. We ask for your patience & understanding as we switch over to this new system.

A Special Request for Our Local History Collections – We would be most grateful to anyone willing to donate yearbooks from Greenwood Lake Elementary and Middle Schools, and from the years that Greenwood Lake students were in Warwick, Monroe and Tuxedo High Schools. Also, we are asking for donations of the Greenwood Lake News prior to 1985. We will be most happy to acknowledge your generosity to the community in "Our Special Thanks" column each newsletter. Unsupervised Children and Young Adults – We welcome your children/young adults in the Library. The Children's area & Young Adult Room are specifically designed for their pleasure. Our staff makes every effort to make an enjoyable library experience for all our patrons. In case of inclement weather, the Library may close early.

The Library is concerned for the safety of all our patrons, including children and young adults. Parents should be aware that in the rare event that behavioral issues arise and your child is asked to leave the Library (or in the case of inclement weather), please be sure your child has **an alternate plan as to where to go or whom to call in such situations**. In either case, we will, of course, allow your child to use our telephone if they need to be picked up.

SOME CLARIFICATIONS . . .

Village/ Library GIGP Grant Correction

In our Summer Newsletter, we announced that the Village of Greenwood Lake and the Library received a New York State Green Innovative Grant of \$560,000 for a joint project, which is designed to give a new "green" face to the municipal parking lot and the Library's entrance areas. We would like to take this opportunity to correct some misinformation that you may have heard at the Village Board meeting of September 6th, 2011. It is not guaranteed that the Library is paying ½ of the 10% matching funds for the grant, **unless it is proven to the Library Board that 50% of the work is on our property.** The Library's proportion of the matching funds will be based on the **proportion of grant funds spent on the improvements on library property.** The Library **has not** passed any resolution regarding the funding for this project. **Lastly, the Library will be funding our share of the matching funds from savings (not at an additional cost to the taxpayers).** Should you have any questions, please call Joan Carvajal, Library Director, at Ext. 103, or Sandy Newman, Secretary to the Board of Trustees, at Ext. 102.

Warwick Valley Dispatch Correction

The Greenwood Lake Public Library would like to clarify information reported in the August 24th, 2011, edition under the headline, "G.L. School Board Accepts a Motion on the Fixed Tax Levy." The way the second paragraph of that article reads, it appears that the Greenwood Lake Public Library tax rate increased by \$1.50 per thousand. **This is inaccurate.** Our tax rate has remained fixed at \$6.41/.42 per thousand for the last three years—since July 1st, 2009. The \$1.50/thousand increase is not a result of the Library's budget. **Also, although the library tax appears as a separate line item on your school tax bill, the library budget is voted on separately from the school budget and the budget vote is held at the Library.**

INCLEMENT WEATHER POLICY

The closing policy for the Library is as follows:

- No fines will be assessed for library materials on a day the Library is closed or closes early.
- If the schools are on a delayed opening, the Library is on the same delay.
- If school is closed, the Library is on a 2-hour delay. The decision to open the Library or remain closed is made by 10 a.m.
- The Library may close early during a day or evening when the weather is inclement.
- A message will be on our phone system at (845) 477-8377 which will indicate a delayed opening or closing.
- Library and school delayed openings or closings are listed on www.cancellations.com.
- Children's and adult library programs that are scheduled during the hours of a library delayed opening or closing are cancelled.
- All community groups' or individuals' programs or events scheduled in the Library's Program or Tutoring Rooms during a Library delayed opening or closing are cancelled.

The Greenwood Lake Public Library serves all residents of the Greenwood Lake Union Free School District. Please visit us for a tour and explanation of all the resources available to you through the Greenwood Lake Public Library. Be sure to stop by the Front Desk where a staff member will be happy to supply you with an application for a library card. All you need to receive a library card is two forms of identification (one of which must be a picture I.D., preferably a driver's license), with your current Greenwood Lake address. We also ask for your date of birth, which distinguishes you from other library patrons with the same name. There are nearly 50 libraries in the Ramapo Catskill Library System (RCLS) from which you can inter-library loan materials. These materials can be picked up at and returned to our Library. We hope you will take advantage of all of the Library amenities, programming, and materials we offer!

REFERENCE RESOURCES

Computer Services for Students – We have seven Public Access Computers in our Computer Area with Microsoft Office (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Publisher) as well as access to the Internet. On the opening screen of the Public Access computers, there is a Student Reference Web Sites folder. This contains links to sites for all types of school projects. There are also computers in the Young Adult Room and Adult Reference Area. These also have Microsoft Office, but **do not** have access to the Internet. **All children under 18 must have a signed permission slip on file at the Library to use our computers; parents must come in to the Library in-person to sign the permission slip and have our computer rules explained.** Check out our CD ROM collection, which offers many educational programs available for loan!



School Reports Bookcase – This bookcase, located to the left of our Staff Room, holds books in reserve (to use in the Library) for many of the assigned school projects. This saves you the time of searching for books, as well as ensures that every child will find something to use for their report. Binders containing Internet information on specific school projects and information on how to write a bibliography are also located here. Elementary and Middle School text books are kept here (to use in the Library). **Photocopies of the assignment pages required can be made; the first \$7 worth in black and white or color are free for school projects.**

Educational Online Databases Linked to Our Web Site – We have a wide variety of databases available, which provide access to encyclopedia, newspaper, magazine and journal articles, as well as Learning Express Library – a great source for test preparation materials, interactive practice exams, and E-books. Simply go to our web site at www.gwllibrary.org, click on Library Catalog and click the Research Databases tab. The page will open up to all the databases under the General category heading; if none of these databases have what you require, simply click on the category heading that best suits your needs and check out the databases available to you. These databases can be accessed at the Library or at home. You may be asked for your library barcode, which is on the back of your card when you attempt to access the site at home. Just enter it and you are ready to begin your research!

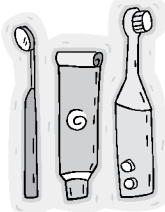

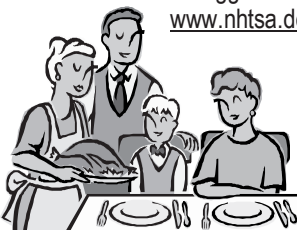
