A Note from the Director,

Fall is upon us, our children are back in school, and your Library plans to continue to provide you with the wonderful array of materials, services, resources, and new programs that you have come to expect for your valuable tax dollars! Because this is such a busy season for us all, there is much to say! I would first like to point you to some "don't miss" sections in our newsletter:

Reference Resources – This section highlights resources which are helpful to students & life-long learners in their quest for knowledge.

The Big Read 2010 – Our Library is again taking part in The Big Read (*The Big Read is an initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with the Institute of Museum and Library Services and Arts Midwest*). The Big Read is a county-wide initiative coordinated by the Orange Library Association (OLA). Beginning October 1st, Orange County's 17 public libraries will celebrate the literary genius of Edgar Allan Poe. This effort is supported by a \$17,050 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts and matching funds from local organizations. The program provides citizens with the opportunity to read and discuss a single author within their communities, encouraging reading for pleasure and enlightenment. Special care was taken to develop programs, events, and book discussions not only for adults, but also for children and young adults. The Big Read is a true literary experience for the entire family. There are over 80 different programs and events scheduled at libraries and venues throughout Orange County, as detailed in the Big Read Program section of this newsletter. Our Library is hosting nine programs/events. Please visit the Library to pick up a copy of OLA's *The Big Read 2010* newsletter, which details all of the programs/events throughout the county. Don't miss this opportunity to enjoy a literary treasure as well as some wonderful programs with, not only your family, but your county as well!

Children's, Young Adult, Family, and Adult Programming – This fall Kelly Corrado in Adult Services, Jill Cronin in Youth Services, and Tara Forte, our Mad Scientists' Club Supervisor, have planned quality programs designed to educate, entertain & inspire patrons of all ages.

Special mention should also be made of three other great Library offerings of which you should not fail to take advantage:

Downloadable Free Books on One Click Audio – One Click provides access to your Library's eContent (digital versions) collection of eAudiobooks and eBooks, which can be accessed from your Library's web site (www.gwllibrary.org), 24/7. Register at the Library on our computers (in order to authenticate you as member of the Greenwood Lake Public Library's subscription plan, you must have a Greenwood Lake Public Library card to register). Once registered, you can then download eContent onto your home computer and transfer it to your preferred listening or viewing device.

Overdrive – This is a second site at which you may gain entry to eContent. This, too, can be accessed via the Library's web site (www.gwllibrary.org) and you must have a library card. Click on the

Library Catalog button at the bottom of our home page and then click on the Digital Downloads tab at the top of the page. Click on Log In and follow the instructions. You can then view even more eContent!

For help with either **One Click** or **Overdrive**, please call the Library and speak with either me (Ext. 13) or Liz Cisek (Ext. 15).

Museum Passes – Museum passes are available for check out by adults and families. For more details, call Jill Cronin (Ext. 19).

A few gentle reminders so that we may better serve you:

Library Cards – Please remember we **cannot** check out any library materials without your library card. Also, if sending someone to pick up your materials, please call us and we will put a note in your record permitting them to do so. They must have your library card and their I.D. or their own library card to check the materials out. As a member of the Ramapo Catskill Library System, we are required to enforce system rules in order to protect you and your account. **If you have a silver library card, we'll replace it for free with a new card, which will provide you with a handy key tag card for your key ring!**

Computers – All children under the age of 18 must have a permission slip signed by a parent to use the Library's public access computers. Parents must come to the Library **in person** to sign the permission slip and to have the computer rules explained to them.

Unsupervised Children and Young Adults – We welcome your children/young adults in the Library. Our Children's area and Young Adult Room are specifically designed for their pleasure. Our staff makes every effort to make an enjoyable library experience for all our patrons. In the case of inclement weather, the Library may close early. The Library is concerned for the safety of all our patrons, including children and young adults. Parents should be aware that in the rare event that behavioral issues arise and your child is asked to leave the Library (or in the case of inclement weather), please be sure your child has **an alternate plan as to where to go or whom to call in such situations**. In either case, we will, of course, allow your child to use our telephone if they need to be picked up.

Food for Fines – Sadly, I must announce that **the Library will no longer be able to offer the Food for Fines program**. The original spirit of this program was to help provide holiday food products for families in need, as well as to help our patrons reduce their fines. Unfortunately, Food Pantry personnel informed us that, over the past few years, the majority of the food that the Library received in exchange for fines and delivered to the Food Pantry was discarded because it was expired (despite the Library's specific request for food that **was not** expired since the Food Pantry could not use it). Thus, we feel that this program no longer serves either the Food Pantry or our taxpayers well (fines collected go towards reducing your tax levy). The Library will continue to serve as a drop off point for the Food Pantry (**during November and December only**) and deliver the food to the Pantry. We will strive to continue to run periodic programs (such as our Easter Basket program in the spring) that will benefit the Food Pantry. The Library encourages all community members to remember our neighbors in need by donating to the Food Pantry, not only during the holidays, but all year-round.

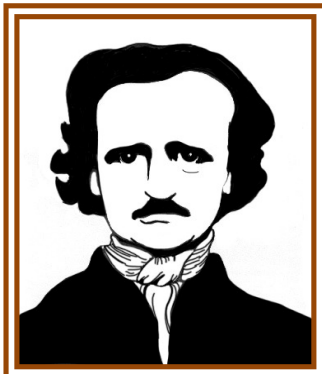

THE BIG READ 2010—GREAT TALES AND POEMS OF EDGAR ALLAN POE

The programs & events scheduled at the Greenwood Lake Public Library are:



Dark Art-A Student Art Exhibition – through October 31st. Students exhibit artwork inspired by the works of Edgar Allan Poe displayed at the Works of Art Gallery at the Library.

Exhibit: The Comical Side of Edgar Allan Poe – through October 31st. This special exhibit by Greenwood Lake senior resident, Norm Westphal, displays Edgar Allan Poe comic books.

Poe to Pictures – Saturday, October 16th, at 1 p.m., for Grades 7-12. Teams of 4-5 teens/tweens will record video interpretations with a Flip Cam of Poe's poetry. **Participants will compete for movie theatre passes. All videos will be viewed at this program followed by a pizza party.**

The Big Bleed for The Big Read: Give a Pint for Poe blood drive – Friday, October 8th, from 3-7 p.m. The Library hosts Community Blood Services blood mobile, which will donate one children's book to the Library for every donor who donates blood. *Donors should bring an I.D. with signature, weigh over 110 lbs., and be in general good health. Minimum age is 16 years old. Donors over the age of 75 must bring a doctor's note indicating that they are in good health and are able to donate blood. Reservations are available at the Library. Prior registration is required for reservations. Walk-ins are welcome.*

Movie Night: An Evening with Edgar Allan Poe – Tuesday, October 12th, from 7-9 p.m. Two films will be shown, *Biography: The Mystery of Edgar Allan Poe* by the Bio Channel and *An Evening of Edgar Allan Poe* narrated by Vincent Price. *Movie fare will be served. ADULT program; YOUNG ADULTS (Grade 7 & up) invited to attend.*

The Gold Bug of Farrow Point Book Discussion – Thursday, October 14th, at 6:30 p.m., for Grades 3-6. Children will read this book by Author Jack Pyle, which is loosely-based on Edgar Allan Poe's, *The Gold Bug*, which he wrote in the mid-1840s and which inspired a nation to use codes and ciphers. *The book is now available for check out at the Library's Front Desk. Please allow ample time for your child to read the book.*

Secret Codes and Ciphers – Saturday, October 16th, from 10:30-11:30 a.m., for Grades 3-6 presented by Mad-Science of the Mid-Hudson. After reading *The Gold Bug at Farrow Point*, children can learn how to create their own secret codes. **In-person registration required.**

Great Tales and Poems of Edgar Allan Poe Book Discussion – Sunday, October 17th, from 12-2 p.m. Award-winning Educator, Wendy Dembeck, leads this discussion of three of Poe's short stories, *Cask of Amontillado*, *The Pit and the Pendulum*, and *The Purloined Letter*. Wendy will bring copies of Poe's poems with the possibility of arranging a non-rehearsed readers' theatre-type reading of *The Raven*. *Books now available for check-out. Allow ample time to read the book before the book discussion. ADULT program. In-person registration required.*

Close Encounters with Birds of Prey – Thursday, October 21st, from 6:30-8:30 p.m. Bill Streeter, Zoologist of the Delaware Valley Raptor Center, will entertain and educate you with his 30 years of experience with the raptors of the Northeast using 5 or 6 raptors. **FAMILY program.**

Some Welcoming Information to All New Residents

The Greenwood Lake Public Library serves all residents of the Greenwood Lake Union Free School District. Please visit us for a tour and explanation of all the resources available to you through the Greenwood Lake Public Library. Be sure to stop by the Front Desk where a staff member will be happy to supply you with an application for a library card. All you need to receive a library card is two forms of identification (one of which must be a picture I.D., preferably a driver's license), with your current Greenwood Lake address. We also ask for your date of birth, which distinguishes you from other library patrons with the same name. There are nearly 50 libraries in the Ramapo Catskill Library System (RCLS) from which you can inter-library loan materials. These materials can be picked up at and returned to our Library. We hope you will take advantage of all of the Library amenities, programming, and materials we offer!

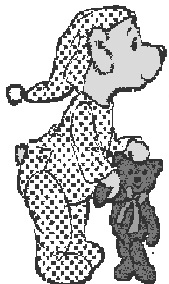

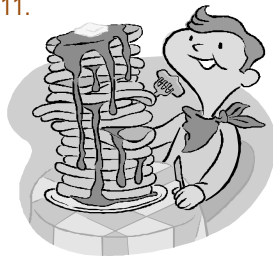

Summer Reading Program Winners

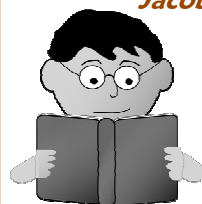

REFERENCE RESOURCES

Computer Services for Students – We have seven Public Access Computers in our Computer Area with Microsoft Office (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Publisher) as well as access to the Internet. On the opening screen of the Public Access computers, there is a Student Reference Web Sites folder. This



contains links to sites for all types of school projects. There are also computers in the Young Adult Room and Adult Reference Area. These also have Microsoft Office, but **do not** have access to the Internet. **All children under 18 must have a signed permission slip on file at the Library to use our computers; parents must come in to the Library in-person to sign the permission slip and have our computer rules explained.** Check out our CD ROM collection, which offers many educational programs available for loan!

School Reports Bookcase – This bookcase, located to the left of our Staff Room, holds books in reserve (to use in the Library) for many of the assigned school projects. This saves you the time of searching for books, as well as ensures that every child will find something to use for their report. Binders containing Internet information on specific school projects and information on how to write a bibliography are also located here. Elementary and Middle School text books are kept here (to use in the Library). **Photocopies of the assignment pages required can be made; the first \$7 worth in black and white or color are free for school projects.**

Educational Online Databases Linked to Our Web Site – We have a wide variety of databases available, which provide access to encyclopedia, newspaper, magazine and journal articles, as well as Learning Express Library – a great source for test preparation materials, interactive practice exams, and E-books. Simply go to our web site at www.gwllibrary.org, click on Library Catalog and click the Research Databases tab. The page will open up to all the databases under the General category heading; if none of these databases have what you require, simply click on the category heading that best suits your needs and check out the databases available to you. These databases can be accessed at the Library or at home. You may be asked for your library barcode, which is on the back of your card when you attempt to access the site at home. Just enter it and you are ready to begin your research!

Children's Reference Area – Our Children's Reference collection includes: General Encyclopedias, State Books, Field Guides, Junior Judaica, Encyclopedia of American Indian Civilization, Popular Science, Astronomy & Space, Animal Life Encyclopedia, World Book Biographical Encyclopedia, Guinness Middle Ages, Endangered Species, Science Encyclopedia, Lands & People, Supreme Court, United Nations, Congress, and much more!

Young Adult Reference Area – Our Young Adult Reference collection includes: General Encyclopedias, Today's Science on File, Great Books of the Western World, American Eras & Decades, African American Culture & History, Hispanic America, Latin American History, a set of books on American Immigrants, Encyclopedia of the American Civil War, Reference Library of Native North America, American Indian Contributions to the World, Native American Myths, Nations of the World, Civilizations of the Ancient Near East, Encyclopedia of the Renaissance, a set of books on diseases, Encyclopedia of Animals, Shakespeare for Students, binders with Internet information on school projects and much more!
